Headteacher's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

This week was an exciting one for our students, with two major initiatives designed to inspire curiosity, ambition, and informed decision-making about their futures.

Our first initiative, GCSE Focus Week, took place for Year 9 students. This whole-school programme aims to showcase our GCSE and KS4 courses, provide meaningful insight into subjects, support students in making informed decisions about their future pathways, and encourage conversations about aspirations and next steps. Throughout the week, students have taken part in taster lessons and activities across a range of subjects. Each student has received an "evidence grid" to track their experiences, reflect on what they've learned, and collect staff signatures. At the end of the week, we will celebrate engagement and effort with rewards. Please talk with your child about future goals and the subjects they enjoy, explore career pathways linked to GCSE subjects, and remind them that exploring options is an important part of the process.

Our second initiative took place on Wednesday 26th November, when we were thrilled to welcome the BAE Systems STEM Roadshow, in partnership with the Royal Navy and the Royal Air Force. This year's theme was Artificial Intelligence (AI), and the roadshow provided an engaging and interactive experience for our Year 7 and Year 8 students. Both initiatives above reflect the College's



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commitment to preparing students for the future, whether that's choosing the right GCSEs or exploring cutting-edge technology and careers.

This week ended with a visit from Anna Gelderd MP for South-East Cornwall as part of UK Parliament Week. Anna visited Torpoint Community College along with other schools in South-East Cornwall. She was met by our student leadership team and, although this was a brief visit, the students were able to ask her questions on a range of topics and talk about their own career plans. Anna left the students with "I met my MP" stickers and a personal, signed certificate for taking part in this year's UK Parliament Week.

As we enter the festive season, with "Christmas Party Pieces" to look forward to, Torpoint Community College will once again be supporting two important charity initiatives to help those in need within our local and wider community. We hope you will be able to support us in making a meaningful difference this December.

The first initiative is our collection of donations for the local Liskeard & Looe Foodbank, which works across South-East Cornwall, including Torpoint, to provide emergency food parcels and support for individuals and families facing hardship.

The second is Christmas Jumper Day on Friday 19th December, when students are invited to wear a festive jumper to raise money for Action for Children, a UK charity supporting vulnerable young people and families.

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


Reading News at TCC!

What are we currently reading in English?

Year 7 – Autobiographies

Our Year 7 students are exploring the world of autobiographical writing. They are currently reading extracts from:

- **Boy by Roald Dahl** – a humorous and vivid account of Dahl's own childhood, giving pupils insight into how writers shape real experiences into engaging narratives.
- **I Am Malala** – an inspiring modern autobiography that introduces students to themes of courage, education, and global activism.
- **My Family and Other Animals by Gerald Durrell** – a charming and witty memoir that brings the natural world to life through Durrell's recollections of his childhood in Corfu.



Year 8 – Tragedy Through Time



Year 8 are travelling back through literary history in our **Tragedy Through Time** unit. This term, they are studying:

- **Oedipus Rex** by Sophocles – a cornerstone of Greek tragedy that introduces students to fate, prophecy, and dramatic irony.
- **Romeo and Juliet** by William Shakespeare – a powerful Renaissance tragedy that allows students to compare how tragic conventions develop across time.
- The unit encourages students to think about how big ideas—such as love, destiny, and human flaws—are explored differently across historical periods.

Year 9 – Women in Society

Year 9 are delving into the role and representation of women in literature. As part of our **Women in Society** scheme, students are reading extracts from:

- **Jane Eyre by Charlotte Brontë** – examining Jane's struggle for independence, identity, and equality in a restrictive society.
- **Pride and Prejudice** – examining social expectations and women's choices in Regency England.





On 11th November, our Year 7B and Year 7C Netball teams travelled to play against Looe School. For many of these students, it was their first fixture representing the school, and they were very excited!



In the second half, we produced some brilliant spells of football, with Lily G working tirelessly in midfield. Ava L, Eliza Z, Erin B, Lilly H, and Holly S battled hard to create chances for striker Kayla, but Brannel continued to have the better opportunities.

At 3–0 down, a clever positional change by Assistant Manager Sarah Stacey paid off when Torpoint found the net, thanks to a superb left-footed strike from Poppy S just inside the 18-yard box. The game was back on, and we created several chances on target, but couldn't quite beat the Brannel keeper. Despite brave goalkeeping from Ellie W, Brannel scored twice in the final five minutes, making the final score 5–1.

The scoreline doesn't reflect the quality of the performance. The girls played excellently, some were representing the school for the first time, others playing their first-ever football match, and it was the first time these 12 players had played together. They never gave up, showed great teamwork, and I couldn't be prouder. Amy W was voted Player of the Match by the opposition for her outstanding defensive contributions, including a crucial goal-line clearance!

E-Safety

Cyberbullying can be hard to detect—it doesn't happen in hallways, but on screens. It might involve hurtful comments, sharing private photos, or being excluded from group chats. It can seriously impact a young person's confidence and mental health.

⌚ What You Can Do:



Look for signs such as mood changes, avoiding school, or becoming secretive about devices.



Encourage your child to save any messages and talk about what happened.



Help them block/report the user and speak to the school or relevant platform.



Remind your child that they're not alone- and that speaking up is the first step to stopping it.

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Homework Support Available for all Students at TCC!




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TCC is now a local donation point for the Torpoint foodbank along with Sainsbury's and the Co-op.

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Effective communication between parents and school staff is vital to ensure your child receives the best possible support and education. This guide outlines the appropriate channels for different types of enquiries and sets clear expectations to help foster respectful and productive interactions.

Who to Contact for Different Types of Inquiries:

General Day-to-Day Inquiries

For routine questions or concerns about your child's school life, please contact your child's **Tutor** in the first instance. They are best placed to address most day-to-day matters and provide the necessary support.

Higher-Level Concerns

If your concern is more significant or goes beyond everyday issues, you should contact your child's **Head of Year**. They can address broader issues relating to your child's academic progress, behaviour, or well-being.

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Concerns

For specific concerns related to your child's additional learning needs or their SEND provision, please contact the **SENDCo** (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Coordinator). *Please note: The SENDCo should only be contacted for higher-level concerns regarding your child's support needs. For more general issues, we kindly ask that you contact your child's Tutor first. This ensures concerns are handled efficiently and by the right staff member.*

Curriculum-Related Concerns or Major Issues

For concerns about the school curriculum, significant school-wide matters, or if you wish to make a formal complaint, please contact a member of the **College Leadership Team (CLT)**. They are equipped to address higher-level issues and ensure that school policies are followed appropriately.



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
EVERYDAY COUNTS



Why is attendance important for my child's education?

Good attendance means:

Being in school at least **95%+** of the time.



Attendance- Information about Penalty Notices

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days.

Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the government.



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


