Headteacher's Message

I would like to begin this newsletter by marking Holocaust Memorial Day, observed this week on 27th January, the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau in 1945. This is an important moment for remembrance and reflection. This week, students have taken part in assemblies led by Mr Miller, helping them to understand these historical events and, crucially, to reflect on the importance of standing up against prejudice, discrimination and hatred in all its forms. Holocaust Memorial Day reminds us of our shared responsibility to learn from the past and to work towards a more compassionate and just future.

Many families will have seen recent media coverage and correspondence from the Education Secretary regarding mobile phone use in schools. The updated guidance reinforces the expectation that schools should be phone-free environments throughout the entire school day, including lessons, movement time, breaktimes and lunchtime.

Our existing approach already reflects this guidance, and we welcome the clear emphasis on the importance of parental support in ensuring these policies are successful. We will continue to keep families informed should there be any further clarification.

It has been another exceptionally positive few weeks for our students, particularly in sport. Our football teams have represented the college superbly, with notable success for both our U15 Girls and several younger teams competing in cup fixtures. These matches showcased not only talent and determination, but also excellent sportsmanship and teamwork. The wet weather has unfortunately led to games being rescheduled.

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Our badminton squads have also performed brilliantly in the County Round of the National Badminton Competition at Truro School. 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Subject Spotlight: English

This week's subject spotlight shines on English, where students across all year groups are developing their reading, writing and communication skills through a rich and engaging curriculum.

In **Year 7**, students are exploring poetry, learning to identify literal and figurative language and beginning to uncover the hidden meanings within poems. Through careful reading and discussion, they are developing confidence in interpretation and discovering how poets use language to express ideas and emotions in creative ways.



Year 8 students are studying influential speeches, analysing how writers and speakers use rhetorical devices to persuade an audience. Alongside this, students are practising spoken delivery, learning how tone, pace and emphasis can provoke an emotional response and make a message more powerful.

In **Year 9**, the focus has been on detective fiction through a study of *The Hound of the Baskervilles*. Students are exploring genre conventions such as mystery, suspense and characterisation, while developing their analytical skills by tracking clues, themes and authorial intent.





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
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
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Subject Spotlight: English

Year 10 students are deepening their understanding of *Macbeth* as part of their GCSE English Literature course. Lessons are focused on securing knowledge of the plot, learning key quotations and exploring the historical and social context of Shakespeare's world, helping students build strong foundations as they prepare for future examinations.



In **Year 11**, students continue their preparation for English Language Paper 2, with a focus on identifying and analysing writers' viewpoints and perspectives. Through practice questions and close reading of non-fiction texts, students are refining their ability to compare ideas, analyse language choices and construct effective responses under exam conditions.



Across all year groups, English lessons continue to emphasise the importance of reading, critical thinking and confident communication—skills that support success both in school and beyond.



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
Holocaust Memorial Day

Every year Holocaust Memorial Day is marked internationally on 27th January. The date is significant as the anniversary of the liberation of the largest Nazi death camp, Auschwitz-Birkenau. At TCC, we are a Beacon School, accredited for our investment into education regarding the Holocaust.

During the Autumn Term, in Year 8 Art classes, the students were tasked with responding to the theme for the 2026 Holocaust Memorial Day which is 'Bridging Generations.' Students listened to stories of holocaust survivors and their descendants and took on the challenge of representing these survivors and families in their own artwork. Some classes were inspired by artists such as David Kassan and Martin Schoeller in their portrait work on holocaust survivors. Some classes used portraits of survivors and their descendants to create interesting collage and mixed media pieces. Kassan's 'Facing Survival' series depicted survivors through realistic and highly engaging paintings. Schoeller was tasked with interviewing and photographing 75 survivors with the final images printed on a large scale for exhibition. Both artists created imposing work with an aim to promote conversation and enable the stories of these survivors to be told. Our students were inspired by artists like this to express their thoughts and emotions through discussion around the Holocaust and in creating their own personal art response.

The Year 8 artwork shown here is a collection of portraiture in a range of media. Capturing the facial expressions and characters of the Holocaust survivors and their families in the drawing and mixed media work was an interactive way for students to become familiar with each individual and their journey whilst exploring their own journey in artistic self-expression. The results show some moving and reflective portraits with themes of survival through suffering, humanity, family, compassion and understanding. Well done Year 8 on a super collection of work!



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
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Attendance: January- New Year, New Goals

Let's set new goals for attendance and achievement. If your child is on 100% attendance, let's keep this amazing record going throughout the academic year. If your child is not currently on 100% attendance, let's see how much closer we can get to it by the February half term.

Let's make 2026 a year of aspiration, hard work, and success.

Our students have already hugely impressed us all in the first two half terms, with an average of 200 students qualifying for their celebration breakfast each half term for having attended every day during that half term (allowing for one missed session due to meetings or appointments). It has been genuinely wonderful to reward their consistent effort to make everyday count.

This term has also seen the start of the Attendance Spring Challenge. A selected number of students across all year groups now have the opportunity to have one-to-one conversation with their tutor each week during tutor time. This allows us to best support them with any worries they may have, including any issues around attendance.

With your support as parents and carers, we are working tirelessly to achieve a whole-school attendance target of 92%, because we know that good attendance is key to success and every one of our students deserves that success.





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The Merit Sprint: Celebrating Effort, Achievement and Positive Choices

Over the last week, students across all year groups have been taking part in an exciting whole-school initiative called **The Merit Sprint**.

The Merit Sprint was designed as a friendly competition between year groups, with students earning **merit points for positive behaviour, effort and achievement**, while negative behaviour points were deducted. Each year group's score was calculated using the **average points per student**, ensuring the competition was fair and that every individual contribution mattered.

Throughout the week, students could track their progress as the "race" unfolded, with year groups pushing themselves to make positive choices, collect merits, and support one another. The competition culminated in a final sprint to the finish line.

And the winners are... Year 7!

After a strong and consistent performance, **Year 7 finished in first place** with the highest average points and were crowned winners of the Merit Sprint. As a reward for their fantastic efforts, Year 7 earned a **mufti day on Friday 30th January**. Congratulations to all involved!

Why merits matter

The Merit Sprint wasn't just about winning. Its key aim was to **reinforce the value we place on positive behaviour, effort, and attitude**, and to ensure that students of all ages are **fairly recognised** for doing the right thing.

Since relaunching our merit system, we have been particularly keen to ensure that **older students have equal access to rewards**, and that merits are awarded consistently across the school. The data from the Merit Sprint showed that average merit scores were broadly similar across year groups — a really positive sign that students are being recognised fairly and that our systems are working as intended.

By placing a high status on earning merits, we want students to understand that **small, positive actions every day really do add up** — whether that's being punctual, completing homework, being attentive in lessons, or supporting others.

What's next?

The success of the Merit Sprint has set the stage for our next challenge: "**Beat Your PB**", where year groups will aim to beat their own Personal Best average scores. More details will follow soon — but one thing is clear: positive choices will continue to be celebrated and rewarded.

Well done to all students and staff for making the Merit Sprint such a success.

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
TCC Day of Reading – Celebrating the National Year of Reading

Last Friday, TCC proudly held its first Day of Reading as part of the National Year of Reading. To mark the occasion, every lesson across the school began with ten minutes of teachers reading aloud from a high-quality, subject-specific text.

From Science and Maths to History, Art and Languages, students experienced first-hand how reading matters in every subject. Staff selected engaging and challenging texts linked to their disciplines, exposing students to a wide range of rich vocabulary, ideas and styles they might not otherwise encounter.

Antibullying



"Just a Joke?" Understanding Banter vs Bullying

Children and teens often describe harmful behaviour as "**just banter**", especially online. However, jokes that upset, embarrass or exclude someone—particularly when repeated—can quickly become bullying. Because tone and facial expressions are missing online, messages can feel **much harsher** than intended.

❑ **Online "banter" may be bullying if it:**

- Targets the same person repeatedly
- Continues after someone asks for it to stop
- Encourages others to pile on
- Makes someone feel embarrassed, anxious or left out

❑ **Common examples include:**

- Mocking emojis or repeated memes about one person
- Screenshots shared to laugh at someone
- "Jokes" about appearance, ability or interests
- Teasing in group chats that singles one child out

❑ **What You Can Do:**

- Help your child recognise how words can impact others online
- Encourage them to stop, mute or leave conversations that feel uncomfortable
- Reinforce that it's okay to say, "That's not funny" or to step away

Teaching children to question "banter" helps them develop respectful digital habits.

Understanding Location Sharing



Many apps used by children and teenagers include **location-sharing features**, sometimes enabled by default. These can show where a young person is in real time, tag locations in photos, or share whereabouts with friends—or even wider audiences—without them fully realising.

While location services can be helpful (for navigation or safety), oversharing can increase risks linked to **privacy, personal safety and digital footprints**.

How location sharing works

Location data can be shared in several ways:

- **Always on** – tracking location in the background
- **While using the app** – only when the app is open
- **One-off sharing** – for a post, photo or check-in

Social media apps, messaging platforms, fitness trackers and games may all collect location data differently.

Top Tips for Parents and Carers

Check location settings together

Go into the device's privacy settings and review:

- Which apps can access location
- Whether access is set to *Always* or *While Using*
- If precise location is necessary, or if approximate location is enough
- If an app doesn't need location, turn it off.

Review in-app location features

Some apps allow location sharing *within the app*, separate from phone settings.

Check for:

- Live location sharing in messaging apps
- Location tagging on photos and posts
- "Nearby friends" or map-based features
- These can often be switched off in the app's privacy menu.

Use family safety tools

Built-in parental controls can help:

- Manage location sharing
- Set age-appropriate privacy defaults
- Monitor app usage without invading trust
- These tools support safety while encouraging responsible independence.

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Safeguarding Alert

Fake 'Celebrity Meet and Greet' websites targeting children

We have been made aware of a growing number of websites claiming to offer children the opportunity to meet or chat virtually with celebrities. These sites are **NOT** legitimate. They are designed to draw children into online environments where unknown adults can initiate contact.

These platforms often mirror the format previously used by **Omegle** which is a website known for high risk random videochatting. This site was closed in 2023 but there are multiple copycat and imitation sites that appear credible and child friendly. They host unmoderated live chat features that can expose children to significant harm.

Nature of the risk:

Children accessing the sites have been matched with **adults posing as celebrities**.

These adults use the 'celebrity' premise to begin conversations and build trust quickly.

Some children have been exposed to high risk behaviours including **inappropriate or exploitative communication** initiated by adults.

The design of these sites encourages children to remain online without recognising the danger. This presents a substantial safeguarding concern and the risks mirror those of other forms of online grooming, where offenders deliberately seek contact with children through platforms that appear safe, nurturing and entertaining.

Children and young people are drawn to these sites because:

They promise exclusive access to celebrities or influencers.

They appear fun, exciting or endorsed by celebrities.

Many users are unaware the identities are fabricated or misrepresented.

They often operate without age verification, moderation or safety controls.



What can you do?

Talk to children in a calm non judgemental way about safe online behaviour.

Explain that no genuine celebrity uses random videochat platforms to meet fans.

Reinforce they can talk to trusted adults if anything online feels uncomfortable or wrong.

Supervise online activity, particularly when children and young people are using video based platforms

Check parental controls and privacy settings.

Talk to young people about what sites and apps they are using and explore them together where appropriate.

You can report illegal content or behaviour to CEOP (Child Exploitation and Online Protection)

Key Message

These imitation 'celebrity meet and greet' websites pose serious safeguarding risks. They are designed to mislead children and facilitate harmful adult content. Vigilance, open communication and active supervision are essential to keeping children safe online.



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Homework Support Available for all Students at TCC!



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

Effective communication between parents and school staff is vital to ensure your child receives the best possible support and education. This guide outlines the appropriate channels for different types of enquiries and sets clear expectations to help foster respectful and productive interactions.

Who to Contact for Different Types of Inquiries:

General Day-to-Day Inquiries

For routine questions or concerns about your child's school life, please contact your child's **Tutor** in the first instance. They are best placed to address most day-to-day matters and provide the necessary support.



Higher-Level Concerns

If your concern is more significant or goes beyond everyday issues, you should contact your child's **Head of Year**. They can address broader issues relating to your child's academic progress, behaviour, or well-being.



Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Concerns

For specific concerns related to your child's additional learning needs or their SEND provision, please contact the **SENDCo** (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Coordinator). *Please note: The SENDCo should only be contacted for higher-level concerns regarding your child's support needs. For more general issues, we kindly ask that you contact your child's Tutor first. This ensures concerns are handled efficiently and by the right staff member.*



Curriculum-Related Concerns or Major Issues

For concerns about the school curriculum, significant school-wide matters, or if you wish to make a formal complaint, please contact a member of the **College Leadership Team (CLT)**. They are equipped to address higher-level issues and ensure that school policies are followed appropriately.





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Response Times:



Our staff work hard to support all students and families, often managing a high volume of inquiries. Therefore, please allow up to **2 working days** for a response to any email or phone inquiry. If you consider your inquiry to be urgent, please communicate via email or through the College receptionist the nature of your contact so that the relevant person can determine if an immediate response is required. We appreciate your patience and understanding.

Respectful Communication:



We are committed to fostering a respectful and positive environment for students, staff, and families. We ask that all communication with school staff remains polite and constructive.



If a parent speaks rudely or behaves aggressively toward a member of staff, the staff member has the right to end the interaction immediately. In such cases, the conversation/ meeting will be rescheduled for a later date. We value respectful communication, and our staff should not be subjected to shouting or abuse under any circumstances.

If you would like to meet a member of staff, please email them or contact reception to book an appointment. Due to an array of commitments, staff might not be able to meet without an appointment.

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

Why is attendance important for my child's education?

Good attendance means:

Being in school at least **95%+** of the time.



Attendance- Information about Penalty Notices

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days.

Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the government.



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


